The weekend of 25th October saw in Onslow the gathering of multiple Pilbara marine rescue groups, one from the Midwest, Border Force, Water Police and a stray "helo" for good measure in what was a significant search and rescue training event.



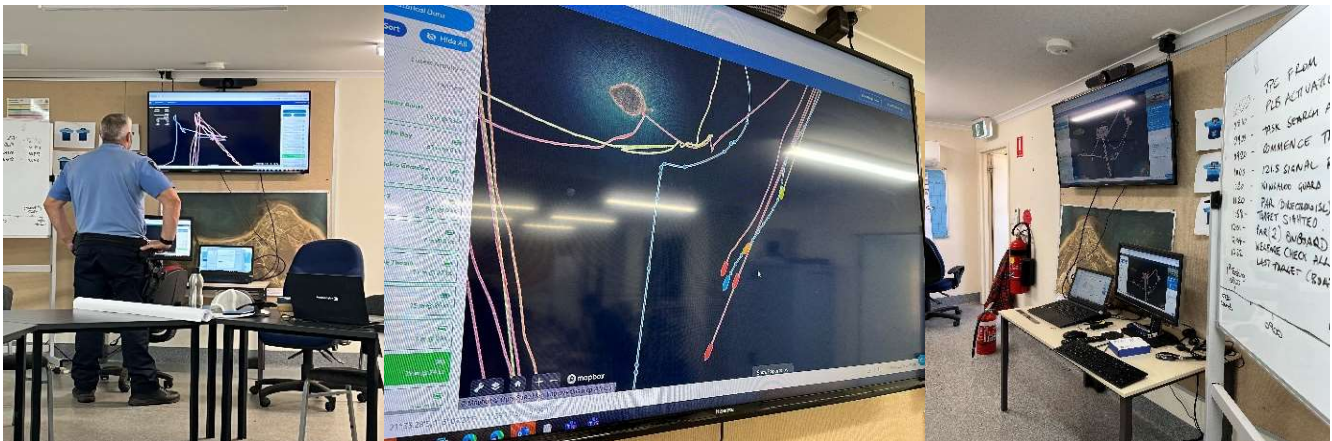


Exmouth's Naiad is seen hiding behind Cygnet as these two travelled up by sea while the trailered mob were parked up at the accommodation area.

With the briefing out of the way on Friday evening, food and camaraderie was the plan for the remainder of the night.

The morning of the event..

Targets were set out with DFES's Bec Benson and Simon Miller coordinating, alongside WAPOL's Paul Crawshaw and Onslow's Commander Mike Chapman.

Locations to be searched, targets (dummies) to be found and lessons to be learnt.

Interestingly a weak 121.5 EPIRB signal was identified by two vessels and was not part of the exercise. While it wasn't an EPIRB, it was believed to be a spurious signal from a device that will require a more detailed investigation.

Soon enough it was over and back they came...

We can verify that our people were much more efficient in the recovery of their vessels and demonstrated this to a couple of recreational 'boaties' on how to do it, one of which was observed trailering their vessel away not all that squarely on the trailer, still not my circus - not my monkey, as they say.



In the end a successful exercise that was beneficial to all that participated. At the debrief the opinion of those on the water was the same as those in the operations room, it was a successful day with much learnt.

Marine Rescue Port Hedland has obtained the last piece of the funding puzzle with significant contributions from DFES, the mining industry, local government, local businesses and Lotterywest.

A recent FB article showing the practical completion of the facility. (Quoted from FB, follows)

'AUSPAN is pleased to announce the Practical Completion of the new Marine Rescue Port Hedland Operations Centre - a purpose built operational base designed to strengthen marine safety and volunteer capability across the Pilbara region.'

'The new facility provides a modern, fit-for-purpose home for Marine Rescue Port Hedland, delivering upgraded communications infrastructure, climate-controlled operational areas, secure equipment storage, and flexible spaces for training, meetings, and community engagement.'

Commander Zac Slaughter highlighted the transformational impact the new facility will have on emergency service volunteers and the wider community:

'This facility will completely transform our operations. Our volunteers finally have a purpose-built home after years working from a 119-year-old building and, more recently, under a shade sail between three sea containers. AUSPAN has delivered a facility that is vastly superior to anything we've ever had - a huge step forward for Marine Rescue Port Hedland.'

AUSPAN Project Manager John Williams also expressed pride in the project, stating:

'AUSPAN is proud to deliver this new facility for the Port Hedland community. It provides Marine Rescue with the capability, space, and resources they need to carry out their vital work more effectively than ever.'

The completion of this project underscores AUSPAN's commitment to delivering essential infrastructure that enhances safety, supports volunteer organisations, and benefits regional communities across Western Australia.'



Meanwhile Carnarvon is still in the mix needing to get the admin/training/operations area next yet to be funded and built but we are all working on that.

Two Rocks is still on the urgent list with Whitfords now sorted and moving into their new multi-agency Ocean Reef Marina complex.

Geraldton joins the ever-increasing urgent list of marine rescue groups without a suitable permanent home due to coastal erosion and with the sea god taking theirs back to his home.

Bunbury will be in the mix what with the port redevelopment planning underway.

Again, VMRWA will be supporting all of these groups (and others) at varying levels with their endeavors to get located in a suitable permanent home.

Back to the AGM's we welcome Geraldton's new Commander Julianne Sproule and Vice Commander Ian Astill to the fold. Ian's well known around the traps conducting Pathways training. And while Julianne will need Ian's assistance, VMRWA isn't against borrowing good people and Ian Astill has been appointed to the role of Regional Commander Midwest.

A very big welcome aboard from Dan, Barb, Roger, Jeff, Sam, Ian, Allan, Adam, Tony, Greg & John.

'Fair winds & following seas PS3'

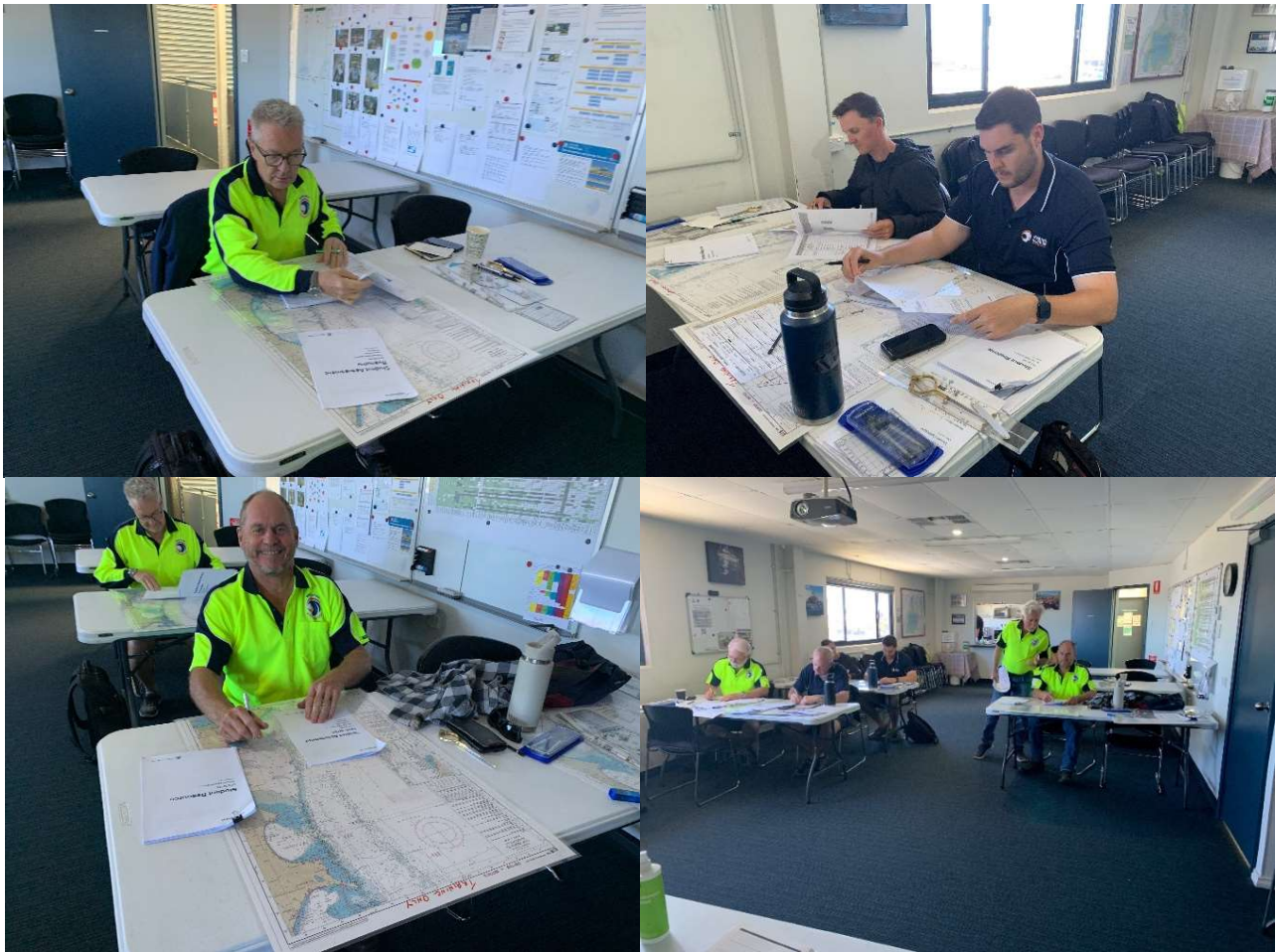


Pathways Training at Mandurah
